For McHugh, it's obvious that Bettelheim must be a liar: he described dissociation provoked by trauma not only in other people's cases, but his own...

This article has a nice discussion of the processes usually held by proponents of the theory to induce Dissociative Identity Disorder / Multiple Personality Disorder...

For victims of severe abuse, motivated forgetting (otherwise known as dissociation) offers not only a means to cope, but also the way to invisibility. Abuse victims are universally enjoined not to show their pain, suffering, rage, and dissent. They must learn to wall off and contain these reactions. "Crying, are you? Well then, I'll give you something to really cry about." Recounting his experiences while a prisoner in the Nazi concentration camps at Dachau and Buchenwald (1938-1939), the late psychoanalyst Bruno Bettelheim described the universal injunction laid on prisoners by the Nazi camp guards: "Don't dare come to my attention." Drawing parallels with the traditional qualities of the "good" child, Bettelheim said that, to the demand "to be seen and not heard (never talk back or express an opinion) was . . . added the further injunction that the prisoner . . . should also be

unseen Invisibility was thus a primary rule of defense" (1960, p. 210-211).

Of his own traumatic dissociation, Bettelheim (1960) wrote that a "split was soon forced upon me, the split between the inner self that might be able to retain its integrity, and the rest of the personality that would have to submit and adjust for survival" (pp. 126-127). In a passage clearly describing a dissociative response, he states: Anything that had to do with present hardships was so distressing that one wished to repress it, to forget it. Only what was unrelated to present suffering was emotionally neutral and could hence be remembered It was not just coercion by others into helpless dependency; it was also a clean splitting of the personality. (p. 197) Bettelheim stressed that his reactions to varieties of events closer to normal were "distinctly different from [these] reactions to extreme experiences" (p. 129). He emphasized that these reactions (amnesia, denial, emotional detachment, and so on) emerged specifically as defenses to extreme traumatic events.

Arguably, the child's experience of abuse happening secretly within their own family poses an even greater threat to integration than that of the adult concentration camp prisoner. At least (and this is a terrible reduction) the prisoners face anonymous persecutors, and they're not altogether alone in their horror. Such is not the case with children caught in a secret horror. To function in daily life, children in acutely abusive families may dissociate the knowledge of their on-going abusive experience so they can hold onto an idealization of their caregivers. Other demands also contribute to the dissociation of knowledge. These include powerlessness, threats against disclosure, injunctions not to trust personal perceptions, attributions of fault laid on the victim, and the stigma of the secret acts themselves.

Third: Certainly, if you have studied this history, you must be aware of the great tensions between Dr. John Money and me when I was his departmental director. He has made them clear in many of his books, usually claiming my opposition to his teachings and practices were driven by my religion rather than, as I have repeatedly stated, my psychiatric knowledge.

Thus, early in my tenure at Johns Hopkins I removed Dr. Money from his role in teaching about sex to the medical students and ultimately moved his office from the main medical campus so as to reduce his influence on our department. I also argued against and ultimately withdrew the support of psychiatry at Hopkins for sex-change operations - a move that led to the cessation of this form of surgery at this institution. I then recruited and trained in psychiatry and child psychiatry a young pediatric urologist, William Reiner, so that a multi-faceted investigator could explore the whole arena of sex organ surgery and sexual orientation in those born with inter-sex abnormalities. I intended to challenge the Money assumption that the sex of rearing of these children will determine their sexual orientation in adulthood - an assumption supporting the universal practice of surgical construction of vaginas in all such children and their rearing

as females. Reiner's work is now being published. It demonstrates the modest influence of rearing and the huge influence of genes and intrauterine endocrine exposure on sexual orientation - a direct refutation of Dr. Money's claim that psychosocial factors outweigh biological factors in forging one's sexual orientation. All of this and my role were described in the Colapinto book "As Nature Made Him." Surely knowledge of these matters should have led you to doubt I gave Dr. Money undue license or accepted his views on sexual matters.

Very few people understand exactly what being an investigator in sexology entails, because very few people -want- to understand:

It gets ugly; THE most malevolent, perverse, and destructive tendencies in human nature grown into deformed molds WILL BE your subjects... unless you're a grazer, a popularizer, just skimming over the "cute" phenomena we see in sexual behaviors, such as "guys who are hung up on tits"?

(paraphrase) "Sexual sadists typically employ objects such as broken bottles to accomplish penetration in rape" - Ray Blanchard (truth)

Which is part of why CAMH has been so awful for TS folk: there you are, going into this prisonlike space for "therapy" (-> gatekeeping) and having to share space in the waiting room with... god knows what.
